She speaks French, Swedish, and is learning Russian.



COP21: NO CHANCE OF TURNING DOWN THE HEAT ON THE ARCTIC

The world's leaders are meeting in Paris this week for the 2015 United Nations Climate Change Conference, generally known as COP21. In the eyes of many, this is the make-it-or-break-it moment for action on climate change. If we don't act now, it's believed, then the world will barrel full steam ahead to a planet that's at least 29°C warmer on average. United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon intoned, "A political moment like this may not come again... We have never faced such a test. But neither have we encountered such great opportunity." But climate activist and journalist Bill McKibben offered a more cynical take on the meeting. Even if world leaders manage to reach an agreement, he

Tips and tricks

Keyword search optimization and hashtags

 Put keywords in title, image, and image alt descriptions. Keep titles <70 characters.

Photos

- Use photos that are Creative Commons licensed
 or better yet, your own.
- Don't name a photo "DSC109.jpg." Name it "Greenland-supraglacial-lake.jpg."
- Resize photos to ideal resolution for fast viewing (ie 800x600 pixels – not 2000x1200).
- Promote your blog on Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, and in your signature
 - Use Tweetdeck to manage personal and professional Twitter accounts side-by-side.
